Word	Answer	Definitions
1. <b>Adverse Childhood Experiences</b>		A. The use of medications with counseling and behavior-al therapies to provide a “whole-patient” approach to the treatment of Substance Use Disorder.
2. <b>Trauma</b>		B. All types of abuse, neglect, and other potentially traumatic experiences that occur to people under the age of 18.
3. <b>Substance Use Disorder (SUD)</b>		C. The recurrent use of alcohol and/or drugs that cause clinically significant impairment, including health problems, disability, and failure to meet major responsibilities at work, school, or home.
4. <b>Opioids</b>		D. A synthetic opioid that is similar to morphine but is 50 to 100 times more potent.
5. <b>Fentanyl</b>		E. An event, series of events, or set of circumstances that an individual experiences as physically/emotionally harmful or life threatening and that has lasting adverse effects on the individual’s functioning and mental, physical, social, emotional, or spiritual well-being.
6. <b>Naloxone/ Narcan</b>		F. Natural or synthetic chemicals that interact with receptors on nerve cells in the body and brain, and reduce the intensity of pain signals and feelings of pain. This includes heroin, fentanyl, Hydrocodone, Oxycodone, Morphine, Codeine, and others.
7. <b>Harm Reduction</b>		G. A set of practical strategies aimed at reducing negative consequences associated with drug use.
8. <b>Medication Assisted Treatment/Therapy (MAT)</b>		H. Any treatment program certified by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to provide medication-assisted treatment for individuals who are diagnosed with opioid use disorder.
9. <b>Peer Support Services</b>		I. A medication used to counter the effects of an opioid overdose. Can be inserted nasally or via an injection.
10. <b>Opioid Treatment Programs</b>		J. Social support services designed to fill the needs of people in or seeking recovery. They are designed and delivered by people who have experienced both Substance Use Disorder and recovery.
