







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AVERAGE EDUCATIONAL DEBT AT GRADUATION, 2019 GRADS

Over half (52%) of Arizona's

kindergarten children have a history of tooth decay, higher than the national average (36%) for 5-year-old children.

Arizona has substantial disparities in oral health, with low-income children as well as Native American and Hispanic children having the highest prevalence of tooth decay in 2014-2015.

More than a quarter

of Arizona's kindergarten and 3rd grade children (28%) have untreated tooth decay, higher than the national average of 22%. (See figure 2)

Current Policies – AHCCCS and CHIP

- AHCCCS coverage for kids for most dental needs
- CHIP coverage with \$10-70 monthly premiums
- AHCCCS coverage for adults (21+) capped at \$1000 for medically necessary emergency only
- ALTCS coverage for adults (21+) capped at \$1000 for medically necessary dental care

Medically Necessary Services

- "Those covered services provided by qualified service providers within the scope of their practice to prevent disease, disability and other adverse health conditions or their progression or to prolong life."

Current Policies - Medicare

- The dental services payment exclusion doesn't apply, and Medicare can pay under Part A and Part B, when dental services are inextricably linked to the clinical success of other Medicare-covered procedures or services."
- Pre-organ transplant
- Pre-head and neck cancer treatment
- Trauma to the jaw

Policies under consideration

■ SB1037 – Expand adult dental benefits

Recent(ish) Policies

- Dental therapy
- Medicare rules
- Teledentistry

Dental Therapy

- 2018 law passed
- 2023 rules finalized and individuals can apply for licensure
- Alternative pathway into the oral health field

Medicare Rules

2023

- Prior to organ transplant surgery (no longer just renal transplant)
- Prior to cardiac valve replacement of valvuloplasty procedure
- Prior to Medicare-covered treatments for head and neck cancer treatments

Medicare Rules

2024

- To address dental or oral complications after head and neck cancer treatment
- Prior to or at the same time as cancer treatment using chemotherapy, chimeric antigen receptor T-cell therapy, and high-dose bone-modifying agents (antiresorptive therapy)



- Law allows exams, consultations, and care coordination
- AHCCCS only reimburses for emergency exams

Teledentistry at A.T. Still University

- Connect a hygienist in the field at juvenile detention with dentist at dental school
- Dental residents meet with patients on Zoom
- Research planned to use teledentistry to connect rural and medically underserved urban health centers with oral pathology specialists
- Research planned to compare remote patient monitoring to m-Health technologies
