
TRIBAL HEALTH FACILITIES IN ARIZONA

This map is designed to support the policy and programmatic efforts of Arizona (AZ) Tribal Nations and to improve health care access across rural and underserved Tribal communities. It provides a visual representation of key Tribal health facilities and other facilities (CAHs, FQHCs, or RHCs) but is not a comprehensive inventory. Certain types of facilities—such as satellite or mobile clinics, school-based health services, behavioral health-only clinics, and dental-only clinics—are not included. The facilities represented on this map include:

Tribally operated 638 (Tribal-638) hospitals and clinics



Tribally operated 638: The Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act, also known as P.L. 93-638, authorizes Tribes and Tribal Organizations to contract for the administration and operation of certain Federal programs, including health related programs, which provide services to American Indian Alaska Natives.²

Urban Indian Health Programs (UIHP): A program operated by Urban Indian Organizations (UIO) that are funded and contracted by Indian Health Service (IHS) to provide direct health care, referral and outreach services to American Indian Alaska Natives (AIAN) living in urban area.3

Dual Designations: A Tribal 638 clinic dually designated as a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) by AHCCCS can, upon request, provide care beyond the clinic's "four walls" through agreements with non-Tribal providers and bill for those services.
