



Fast Facts: Arizona First Responders Initiative

END THE EPIDEMIC

In the midst of statewide and national opioid public health emergencies, the Arizona Center for Rural Health (AzCRH), the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) and others collaborate on a four-year (2018-2021), Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) initiative to train first responders to recognize the symptoms of opioid abuse and to administer naloxone, a drug used to counter the effects of opioid overdose and save lives and learn to screen, briefly intervene and refer for treatment (SBIRT).

PROGRAM FOCUS AREAS

- Distribute Naloxone to First Responders in Arizona**
 AzCRH collaborates with ADHS Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma System (BEMSTS) to supply naloxone (Narcan®) nasal spray to first responders at no cost.
- Provide Opioid Recognition & Response Training for First Responders**
 ADHS, Arizona Peace Officer Standards and Training Board (AZPOST), UA Arizona Emergency Medicine Research Center (AEMRC), and AzCRH provide trainings.
- Pilot Emergency Medical Services Agencies use of the Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) Tool**
 AzCRH, AEMRC, and BEMSTS to assess the use of the SBIRT tool by EMS providers to recognize substance use disorder, opioid overdose and misuse, and provide appropriate intervention and referrals to care with EMS agencies in the state.
